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

School Nurse Notes

ATTENTION 6th GRADE PARENTS

The Ohio Department of Health is now requiring that your child receive a **Tdap** (tetanus, diphtheria, and pertussis) vaccine **AND** the Meningococcal vaccine **prior to entering 7th grade**. If your child has already received this vaccine, please send in a copy of his/ her record so that we can update your child’s record. ATTENTION 11th GRADE PARENTS

The Ohio Department of Health is no requiring that your child receives a Meningococcal vaccine **prior to entering the 12th grade**. If they have had a meningococcal vaccine already it must have been administered after their 16th birthday to count as this requirement. If it was administered before the 16th birthday, a 2nd dose is required at this time.



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Quarantine After Vaccination

New guidance from the CDC indicates that individuals who are vaccinated and are a close contact of a case **DO NOT** need to quarantine granted they meet the following criteria:

- Are fully vaccinated (i.e., ≥ 2 weeks following receipt of the second dose in a 2-dose series, or ≥ 2 weeks following receipt of one dose of a single-dose vaccine)
- Are within 3 months following receipt of the last dose in the series
- Have remained asymptomatic since the current COVID-19 exposure



He will be taking several teachers along with him to help chaperone the 85-90 students who are planning to attend.

Seventh & 8th grade students who earn an 87% or higher average over the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd 9-weeks in both math and Science will receive an invitation to Math and Science Day at Kings Island. This annual trip is a great way for students to experience science and math concepts in action and have fun while learning! The tentative date for the trip is May 12, 2021. Please note: the trip itinerary is subject to change due to COVID restrictions that may occur.

Mrs. Heather Conger's 7th grade math classes and Mrs. Sara Ward's 6th grade math classes will be participating in a Mathathon fundraiser this March for St. Jude's Children's Research Hospital. The students will be completing math Funbook problems and will be asking their friends and family to sponsor them in order to collect donations for St. Jude. Our school has been participating in this fundraiser for several years and has been able to donate a few thousand dollars over the years in order to assist the families who have children who are receiving treatments at St. Jude.

Primary students at the Elementary had a fun start to the winter months

I wanted to use the district newsletter this quarter to share some learning activities and experiences (some unique) that our students have taken part in over the past several months.

In Kindergarten classes, students are working hard on word building, sight words, rhyming, and sentence writing. They are also working on decodable readers and learning new words. In math, students are working on addition and subtraction. Students are also focusing on 3-Dimensional shapes as well as 2-Dimensional shapes (including drawing 2-D shapes), attributes of shapes, and comparing and classifying numbers.

In November, our first graders learned about the voting process! They even participated in a mock election. After teaching the students about voting through books, a Scholastic News magazine, and classroom discussion, first grade teachers turned a small room into a "polling location." Each "precinct" (classroom) voted! The students made their choice on a ballot and placed it in a ballot box. Each classroom counted their votes and revealed the results. It was a great learning experience!

Second grade classes have been doing a variety of STEM activities in the classroom. STEM (science, technology, engineering, and math) engages students with hands-on investigations and encourages critical thinking and problem solving. This fall, students made toothpick towers with gummy candy to see how tall and sturdy they could make their structure. After winter break, we studied force and motion using marshmallow shooters and catapults.

During the second quarter, 3rd grade students learned about matter and forms of energy in science and local government in social studies. They also had a virtual field trip with The Boonshoft Museum of Discovery, which sent materials to our students and led them in several hands-on activities to review the states of matter and demonstrate physical and chemical changes. of experiments to show chemical and physical changes on a larger scale. Carlisle's Mayor and Village Manager spoke to our students through Zoom about the structure of Carlisle's local government, their jobs, and answered students' questions.

As you can tell, the teachers and staff members at Carlisle Elementary are not letting the challenges of the pandemic stop our students from learning and growing in exciting and unique ways.
